# Notes from Easter brook August 26, 2012

This Eastern white cedar is a Mountain tree...straight. This material has character and is compact due to harsh conditions.

Always look for material with many possibilities.

It has a sad melancholy look....has wabi sabi.

The trunk is well weathered from over the years.

Nursery plants lack the character of collected trees

A pot often over bonsais the tree.

Consider using a slab.

Too many bonsai masters try to put their ideas into the tree...subjugate your self to the tree and bring out its natural beauty.

This species is easy to collect because (like all cypress) of a very fibrous shallow root system. They have a wider transplant season in spring.

Grow in lower parts of the mountain....often on islands. Ice is a factor in the creation of shoreline trees.

Like coolness and water.

Leaving lower branches on a tree makes it more shrub like rather than tree like.

Fertilized with 20-5-20 in late spring after recovered from repotting. Mid august used 8- 20 -30 as a finishing conifer fertilizer. N in form of nitrates allowing the tree to absorb it in the coolness of fall. Has been well watered and treated

The tree has character because it is breaking the rules.

We want austere collected bonsai not lush. Lush does not match their growing history.

Do not create a tree with too much jin....and not too long.

When making jin...do tear shaped cut into live wood.

Cedar must be either wet or dry....where dry meets wet rot occurs

Wiring is relaxing...you are creating some order out of chaos. Consider annealing your own fine wire Use the least amount of wire to do the job.

Try to make the wire NOT show.

Thuja has one side foliage pads. If the bottom surface is positioned up, it dies.

To prune....pinch in spring. Cut in fall.

When wiring a branch, work your way outwards just as we work from nebari to apex of the tree.

There is a difference between training wiring and show wiring. Training wiring is thicker. Be neat...keep all wires in the same direction.

Create volume for each branch by building up the wired fronds.
