Club Meeting and Pottery Workshop with Josh Jeram

Executive Board Meeting

Your club's Executive Board is responsible for "all affairs, business, governance, and general management of the Club." The Executive board is composed of the club's President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, immediate past President, Activities Director, Communications Director and Webmaster/ Outreach Director. They are required by our by-laws to meet at least once per year.

The Board met via the Teams virtual meeting platform on January 10, 2023. Here are some of the items discussed or decided by your Executive Board.

- * The board is committed to provide members a form of online payment for dues, workshop fees, raffles, etc. A group will be formed to research what options are available that will work for our club.
- * We will also look into the pros and cons of establishing our club as a not-for-profit entity.
- * Workshop registration and pre-payment will now be required in advance of the event with no walk-in registrations. Most workshops will be limited to 8 participants.
- * Bonsai trees, suiseki or kusamono which members would like to be considered to represent our club for the MABS Spring Festival at the end of March will be solicited and voted on via email. Watch your email at the end of the month for more details and be thinking now about items in your collection that you might want to be considered for the exhibit. A group shohin exhibit may be put together from the trees submitted in order to encourage and allow participation by more club members.

MABS - MidAtlantic Bonsai Societies

We're an acronym-filled society and the bonsai world is no exception. ABS. MABS. BCI. JBP. Even NPK. You might be hearing talk about MABS, especially this time of year. Are you going to MABS? Are you showing a tree at MABS? Where is MABS this year?

When I first started attending club activities, I thought MABS was just the name of a bonsai event somewhere. You go or you don't go. But MABS is more than just an event and it does matter to our club and to each of us as club members.

What is MABS?

MABS is an acronym for the <u>MidAtlantic Bonsai Societies</u>. It is the organization of <u>eleven individual bonsai societies located in the Mid-Atlantic region</u> of the United States and their members. Our club is an affiliate and as a dues paying member of MHBS, you are also a member of MABS.

MABS and each of its member societies strive to help educate the public about the art of bonsai and to provide bonsai instruction and training opportunities. For MABS, this is accomplished primarily through an annual regional event that features some of the top bonsai artists in the world.

The MABS Spring Festival

This year's MABS Spring Festival is March 31 - April 2, 2023 in Parsippany NJ. It will feature the bonsai artists Will Baddeley of Ipswich, United Kingdom, Todd Schlafer of Lakewood, Colorado, and Hugo Zamora Luna of Mexico City, Mexico.

The centerpiece of a MABS festival is an informative and entertaining series of demonstrations by the guest artists. As they work on a tree, they explain what they're doing and why, and answer questions from the audience. The artist-designed trees are then raffled off at the end of the demonstrations.

The guest artists also conduct workshops that give individuals the opportunity to work in a very small group setting with these talented world class bonsai artists. Folks who don't want the hands-on experience can sign up to be a silent observer of the workshops.

There is an exhibition of bonsai trees, suiseki, and kusamono representing each of the member clubs. Pictured to the right are the trees that represented our club at last year's festival. Here's a link to all the trees shown in the <u>club exhibit display</u> at the 2022 festival.

Critiques provide a wonderful learning opportunity for attendees. Small groups walk through the exhibit with one of the guest artists as they express their thoughts and observations on some of the exhibit trees.



MABS and Our Club

As an affiliate, our club provides two representatives to serve as directors on the MABS board, plus an alternate. According to our by-laws, the two representatives are our President and Vice President. In addition, Rob Gordon of our club currently serves as the MABS Treasurer.

Besides providing these representatives, our club also has responsibilities to help make the Spring Festival successful. Currently our club is in charge of registration for the festival which includes the registration form, registration packets, setting up and tearing down the registration table as well as staffing it throughout festival hours. Our club is also assigned one hour for two of our members to watch over the exhibit.

The festival exhibit displays trees from each MABS affiliate club. Our club and all the other ten affiliates are asked to display three to four bonsai trees, suiseki and/or kusamono that owned by their members.

How Our Club and YOU Benefit from MABS

The most obvious benefit of being a member of MABS is your invitation to attend and participate in the Spring Festival each year. Within just a few hours' drive, you can learn from international bonsai artists, appreciate exquisite trees maintained by other regional hobbyists, shop for new bonsai toys, and enjoy the fellowship of others from nearby states who share your passion for bonsai.

What might not be widely known is that each MABS affiliate organization receives funds from the afterexpenses proceeds of the Spring Festival. The funds are allocated to affiliate clubs based on how many of their members (and spouses) attend and participate in workshops.

Funds that are dispersed from the MABS Spring Festival are typically the second largest source of revenue for our club. These funds help finance our club activities throughout the year, allowing us to bring bonsai artists to our area for workshops, demonstrations and lectures.

How You Can Help

Here are some suggestions on how to help with the MABS Spring Festival. Besides experiencing the satisfaction of being involved and contributing to the success of the event, your involvement can help bring funds to our club for our 2023 activities.

* Attend the Festival!

Enjoy the event, learn more about our hobby, meet up with fellow club members and meet new bonsai friends. And the more MHBS members who attend the festival and participate in workshops, the more money our club "earns".

<u>Registration</u> to attend all three days is just \$180. Workshop fees range from \$100-\$180 plus the cost of the tree. (These are Early Bird costs, paid before February 28th). Silent observer costs only \$25 and a critique is just \$30. There is a special hotel rate of \$95/night at the <u>Hampton Inn Parsippany</u>.


Don't miss the opportunity to buy raffle tickets to win a 3-day registration (optional activities extra). Raffle tickets will be sold at our January and February club meetings.

- * Help with our club's registration responsibilities. Help stuff registration packets (whether you're attending or not.) Work an hour or two at the festival registration desk. - * Start preparing a tree, suiseki, or kusamono now to be considered for the festival exhibit. All sizes of trees will be considered. Smaller mame and shohin-sized trees from multiple club members may be used to create a multi-tree club display.

Watch for an email later this month to find out how to submit your item for consideration. We will vote via email in February for the items that will represent our club at the festival exhibit.

News from DJH

Saturday January 14 - Intermediate Class to start. (It's not too late to sign up if you'd like to. Dave can run catch-up sessions if you miss the first one or two lessons.)

Saturday January 28 - The graduates of Pauline's last Intermediate Class have formed a Bonsai Study Group and plan to continue their education, in part, at DJH Bonsai. The initial meeting and work session is scheduled for January 28th.

New project for 2023:

Dave plans to grow and sell plant varieties traditionally used in bonsai, or newer/improved cultivars, that are typically not easy to find. He will start with temperate species and expand into tropicals once the greenhouse is completed, all being well, later this year.

Bonsai Calendar by Pauline Muth

January Indoors

Semi Tropicals and some hardy trees are budding out in response to the increasing length of daylight. Repotting of these trees must be done as the buds swell or before. Begin fertilizing these trees including trace elements and iron. The new rapid growth requires lots of trimming to ensure good ramification. Sunny days are a wonder in the greenhouse but be careful of dark days that will cause weak development on the trees.

Tropicals are holding their own under lights. In the greenhouse, tropicals are still losing leaves. By the end of the month small signs of new life have appeared.

White pines and other young pines kept in the greenhouse are still prunable and wireable. Do not repot older pines but young trees can be potted without radically disturbing their roots.

Pruning of greenhouse specimens can still occur while they are in dormancy. It is a good time to wire trees without leaves.

Sharpen tools, check the pot and soil supply for spring planting. Winter is a good time to sketch dream trees as you observe nature in its winter coat of snow.

January Outdoors

Checks the plants in winter storage. Freezing weather in a protected shelter usually will not harm bonsai but dehydration will. Some winters include periods of freezing and thawing as the outdoor temperatures change. If the temperatures have been changing, check to see if water is needed. Larch left on the ground under evergreens also need to be checked if thawing has occurred. Check for rodent damage.
