Tips from the Pros

I picked up these tips from bonsai pro Sergio Cuan at this years' MABS Spring Festival.

- * While working on a tree, step back often to look at the whole picture.
- * It can be helpful to work against an uncluttered background.
- One of his favorite tools: photography!
 Pictures can pick up design deficiencies or weaknesses better than the eye. Take pictures IN PROCESS while working on a tree, not just beginning and ending.
- He uses the Procreate App to sketch out trees on a tablet. The app also allows you to sketch over a current picture of a tree to design how you'd like to see it in the future.

August Field Trip Workshop and Show & Tell

Our August 24-25 club activity comes in two parts: a field trip and workshop at New England Bonsai Gardens on Saturday followed on Sunday with a show & tell session presented by the workshop attendees.

On Saturday August 24, we'll travel to <u>New England Bonsai Gardens</u> and attend a workshop with John Romano. NEBG is located in Bellingham, MA and features eight greenhouses and an extensive bonsai garden shop. They are recognized as one of the nation's largest, most beautiful and comprehensive bonsai nurseries. John Romano has been teaching bonsai classes and private students at New England Bonsai Gardens since 2000. He heads the Kaikou School of Bonsai, a two year intensive program of bonsai study and practice.

There will be 8 workshop spots available. The workshop cost is \$50 plus the cost of material (estimated at \$125 to \$150). Attendees will chose from assortment of shohin-sized junipers and Japanese black pines that have been selected especially for us.

We will drive over to Bellingham to arrive at NEBG around 10:00a and spend about an hour touring the gardens and bonsai shop. NEBG has generously offered a 10% discount on purchases made that day from the greenhouses or bonsai garden shop.

The workshop with John Romano will begin at noon and run until about 3:00p. Attendees should bring their own tools including wire, and also pack their own lunch, snacks, and beverages.

Then, on Sunday after our club meeting and brunch, workshop attendees will share their workshop learnings and experiences, their trees and purchases at a show & tell session for fellow club members.

Final details are still being worked out at this time. We also hope to work out carpooling arrangements once we have heard from interested club members.

If you have questions and/or would like to pre-register to save a workshop spot, please contact <u>Jon Stewart via email</u> by August 1. Provide your phone number, whether you have a preference for juniper or black pine, and whether you'd be willing to drive. Fees will be collected later.

Bonsai Calendar by Dave Hodgetts

June Outdoors

Whilst full sun is indicated for many species, none benefit from cooked roots. Shade cloth can help decrease both foliage damage in sensitive species (particularly maples) and unacceptable pot temperatures. 30 to 40% shade cloth has been advocated by many and is typically employed from June to September. (As of 5/25/24, Michael Hagedorn, one of my Go-to guys for bonsai information, had just posted an article on this very subject). Other methods which provide shade for our pots can also be useful.

As temperatures rise, water requirements increase, and your trees may require watering more than once (or twice) a day. When possible, I check my trees every 3 to 4 hours, but when I am not present I have found a layer of sphagnum moss on the soil surface helps prevent the soil from drying out quite so fast. Warm and windy days are especially demanding and shelter from the wind can help. Automated watering systems may have a role in certain circumstances, but are no substitute for hand watering, which can be titrated according to your observations and judgement. In addition, automated systems may be prone to unanticipated gremlins, with potentially catastrophic results.

When I must rely on others to water due to my absence, I always stress they cannot kill the trees by overwatering them (given the substrate I use). Underwatering has been a much bigger problem in my experience.

Candle pruning and needle plucking on single and double flush pines continue, if not completed yet.

June is typically the last point at which partial outer canopy defoliation can be performed on those deciduous species that tolerate it. For those species which do not, growing out and trimming back, to encourage ramification and smaller foliage continues, as does leaf removal or cutting to permit more light access to the interior foliage. Rotating one's trees periodically permits equal foliage sun exposure.

Fertilization continues, as determined by the tree's species and developmental status. Systemic antifungal application continues, and topical antifungals remain on hand for use as needed, i.e. for tip blight (Phomopsis). Likewise, topical insecticides are used as needed.

"Bonsai is a long game full of risks and rewards, moments of breezy joy and acute heartache, growth and dieback, ego and non-ego, clarity and confusion, impulse and intention, patience and pig-headedness.

When I really think about it, and I quite realize it's overthinking, when distilled into its essence, bonsai is really something like a complex relationship. The tree has needs - water, sunlight, substrate, a space to grow -and you satisfy them. You have needs-yearning to take care of something, to be creative, to matter-and the tree satisfies them. It is really more of a co-creation, where each being enriches the other, rather than a one-sided thing where man is the creator. In that way, godwilling, both beings end up the better for it."
