October 27 Club Meeting

August minutes were approved and Treasurer report provided.

Review of upcoming activities: November 24 is a BYOT workshop focusing on winter care and storage. February 23 we meet at Faddegon's for a BYOT workshop. Mark Arpag visits April 26-27 and Young Choe visits June 21-22. Activities Director Jon is working on additional dates for visiting artists.

The Club Show & Exhibition next year will be in late May/early June to avoid conflict with the US National/ABS Learning Seminars. Jon will contact Saratoga Library for possible dates.

Outreach Director Guy reports the website is updated for fall. Online payments working well. He also advised members on spotting phishing emails.

Significant items from the Alan Tallman donation will be on silent auction at the holiday party; those proceeds will be split with the donor. October 14 Executive Board Meeting

Minutes from July approved and treasurer report given.

Oversight Committee recommendations have been implemented with club stand inventory taken and documented in club's Google Drive. Documents for the 2024 audit have also been posted in the drive.

Discussion of moving the Club Show & Exhibition for 2025 to late May or early/mid June to avoid conflict with the US Nationals and ABS Learning Seminars in September. Jon will contact Saratoga Library about available dates.

Presentation of trees for the exhibition was discussed: members will be encouraged to have their trees "show ready" and to take advantage of BYOT workshops to prepare trees for exhibition. The idea of show awards was discussed and a Peoples' Choice award will be voted on by show attendees. Also discussed was a greater delineation between traditional displays and trees that are in training. It was decided that accent plant, suiseki, and pot displays should continue to be part of the show.

It was decided that the Communications Director should be the sole source of emails sent to all club members to help avoid phishing/scams, using the updated club member email list.

The board voted to bestow an Honorary Lifetime Membership to Alan Tallman.

A number of items donated by Alan, including Nick Lenz pottery, a turntable stand, wire safe, and Dremel drill kit will be in the silent auction at the holiday party. The proceeds will be split 80/20 between Alan and the club. An invitation to the party has been extended to Alan and guest.

Bonsai Calendar by Dave Hodgetts

Fall pine work can be completed, and once deciduous species have lost their leaves, directional silhouette pruning can be performed.

This month my pesticide regimen includes the application of a granular systemic (Thiophanate methyl) fungicide and Bonide Systemic Insect Control 941 spray.

Now is the time to prepare for winter storage, the main goal being to protect trees from damaging cold and desiccating winds. It is worth repeating that the USDA plant hardiness zones apply to plants and trees growing in the ground, where their roots are relatively well insulated, and the temperatures quoted represent the safe zone within which the upper elements of the plant will not sustain damage. The temperatures at which root damage is likely to occur are not part of the equation and are almost always significantly higher than those required to damage the upper parts of the tree. This problem is exacerbated when the roots are surrounded by a small amount of growing medium in a bonsai pot.

"Root kill" temperatures differ with species of course, and exceptionally hardy trees such as American Larch and Eastern White Cedar can simply be placed on the ground under the benches and out of the wind. For the other temperate species an unheated shed, garage or cold frame can be helpful, with a good general guideline being to prevent the roots from dropping below 23°F. In our area this means additional heat may be required. Weak, recently grafted or heavily worked trees should be kept frost free.

Having said that, too much heat is also problematic, as to maintain their vigor temperate trees require a dormant period typically amounting to 40 days at temperatures between 33 and 40°F. Interestingly, research has shown that time spent below 32°F does not count towards this period.

A storage situation in which the temperature rises above freezing each day, only to drop below freezing at night, leads to repeated free-thaw cycles which can also cause root damage. Some form of ventilation on sunny days may therefore be required.

Although pines can photosynthesize in winter, they do not require sunlight and they, like dormant deciduous trees, can be stored in the dark. In fact, bright sunlight is to be avoided when the trees are frozen, as the needles can burn when they transpire water faster than their roots can supply it.

Rodents can be especially problematic in winter and I find it necessary to set multiple traps. Any form of poison is to be avoided as it can pass up the food chain if the poisoned animal is subsequently taken by a predator.
