## September recap: Artist John Romano

A big thank you to John for his time with MHBS the weekend of September 27th & 28th. The club meeting on Sunday was preceded by a half day workshop and was followed by a presentation on literati design and a demonstration on a whimsical Red Pine.







## **Bonsai by Month by Dave Hodgetts**

#### October (Mid-Autmn)

Daylight hours shorten and temperatures drop. In response to the decrease in light, deciduous species slow and then stop producing chlorophyll. The residual green pigmented chlorophyll is then broken down into smaller molecules and reabsorbed by the tree, revealing the yellow and orange carotenoids, which were present but masked. Simultaneously, the veins within the leaves, which conducted the passage of sap, become occluded and trapped sugars undergo chemical changes that produce new pigments of pink, red and purple, the anthocyanins. Depending on the species, the leaves then either drop (abscission) or persist (marcescence). Oak and Beech for example, typically retain a high percentage of their leaves and many theories have arisen to explain why. No definitive answer has been accepted, however. Reportedly, a Seneca legend suggests the oak keeps its' leaves simply in defiance of winter.

Evergreens continue to photosynthesize, although at a slower rate, and water demands decrease as growth slows prior to winter dormancy. As discussed last month, no fertilization is required at this point.

At DJH prophylactic insecticide is not applied in October but is available for use, should a problem appear. Fungicide application continues and Mancozeb is applied if tip blight on Juniper, Thuja or Chamaecyparis species becomes apparent. Cedar-Apple rust galls may also appear on Junipers around this time and should be removed.

As mentioned last month, Taxus/Yew in development can undergo old needle removal in late September/early October, as the temperature drops and the old, inner foliage begins to yellow. The foliage on the last 1.5 to 2.0 inches of each branch tip is left in place and the majority of the inner "needles" (more from the strong branches and less from the weak) are removed, being careful not to damage any existing buds. This process, coupled with the use of relatively high nitrogen (N >10) feed throughout the active growing season, will result in impressive back budding and increased foliage volume next year. The technique should not be applied on consecutive years.

Mid-September through October is good time for scion grafting on pines and the best time to perform wedge cuts, heavy wiring and bending on pine species. These trees will then require additional protection from cold winter temperatures.

Tropicals, unhappy when the temperature goes below 40 F, will need appropriate protection and lighting.
