## October Recap, MHBS Swap meet



MHBS gathered to buy, sell, and swap material amongst ourselves this past October. It was a fun opportunity for us to exchange material, and lighten our load going into winter. That being said, a few members irresponsibly went home with more than they brought with them!



## **Bonsai by Month by Dave Hodgetts**

November (Late Autumn)

Fall pine work can be completed, and once deciduous species have lost their leaves, directional silhouette pruning can be performed.

This month my pesticide regimen includes the application of a granular systemic (Thiophanate methyl) fungicide and Bonide Systemic Insect Control 941 spray.

Now is the time to prepare for the winter storage of our bonsai, the main goal being to protect them from damaging cold and desiccating winds. It is worth repeating that the USDA plant hardiness zones apply to plants and trees growing in the ground, where their roots are relatively well insulated, and the temperatures quoted represent the safe zone within which the upper elements of the plant will not sustain damage. The temperatures at which root damage is likely to occur are not part of the equation and are almost always significantly higher than those required to damage the upper parts of the tree. This problem is exacerbated when the roots are surrounded by a small amount of growing medium in a bonsai pot.

"Root kill" temperatures differ with species of course, and exceptionally hardy trees such as American Larch and Eastern White Cedar can simply be placed on the ground under the benches and out of the wind. For the other temperate species an unheated shed, garage or cold frame can be helpful, with a good general guideline being to prevent the roots from dropping below 23 degrees F. In our area this means additional heat may be required. Weak, recently grafted or heavily worked trees should be kept frost free.

Having said that, too much heat is also problematic, as to maintain their vigor temperate trees require a dormant period typically amounting to 40 days at temperatures between 33 and 40 F. Interestingly, research has shown that time spent below 32 F does not count towards this period.

A storage situation in which the temperature rises above freezing each day, only to drop below freezing at night, leads to repeated free-thaw cycles which can also cause root damage. Some form of ventilation on sunny days may therefore be required.

Although pines can photosynthesize in winter, they do not require sunlight and they, like dormant deciduous trees, can be stored in the dark. In fact, bright sunlight is to be avoided when the trees are frozen, as the needles can burn when they transpire water faster than their roots can supply it.

Rodents can be especially problematic in winter and I find it necessary to set multiple traps. Any form of poison is to be avoided as it can pass up the food chain if the poisoned animal is subsequently taken by a predator.
